

# Immunization Schedule

## CHILDREN & ADOLESCENTS

(18 months to 18 years)

### FOLLOW THROUGH WITH VACCINES AND BOOSTERS AS CHILDREN GET OLDER.

Speak with your child's primary care provider or pediatrician if you have any questions about vaccines. Any immunization may cause minor side effects, including swelling at the injection site, fever or soreness, all of which should subside within a few days.

#### 18 MONTHS

- 3rd dose of **hepatitis B vaccine**

#### 18-23 MONTHS

- 2nd dose of **hepatitis A vaccine**



#### 11-12 YEARS

- 1st dose of **meningococcal vaccine**
- 1st dose of **human papillomavirus vaccine**
- One dose of **tetanus, diphtheria and pertussis vaccine**
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#### 4-6 YEARS

- 5th dose of **diphtheria, tetanus and acellular pertussis vaccine (DTaP)**
- 4th dose of **inactivated poliovirus vaccine**
- 2nd dose of **measles, mumps and rubella vaccine**
- 2nd dose of **varicella vaccine**

#### 16 YEARS

- 2nd dose of **meningococcal vaccine**

Everyone ages 6 months and older should get a **flu vaccine once per year** unless otherwise recommended by a provider.



**\*Note:** Some vaccination schedules may vary depending on when your child receives the first dose in a series.
